


NEW! A JOURNEY IN THE DIVINA COMMEDIA

The 2014 feStivale was the best ever. Everyone in the San Diego Italian Film Festival wants to thank the ICC board, faculty, staff and students for all their support. SDIFF's most successful year is due in no small part to the efforts of the ICC.

And ICC was well-represented throughout the festival, with students, teachers, members, but also in the classroom, in the advertising and especially in our hearts.

This festival never stops, though. By the time you read this, ICC and SDIFF will have partnered in a sold-out November 21 event hosted at ICC – an evening with Director Angelo Bozzolini. Every ticket disappeared 48 hours after the first announcement!

The San Diego Italian Film Festival also has another major surprise for Sunday, November 23. Director Agostino Ferrente, who did L'Orchestra di Piazza Vittorio, will be here with his newest and highly acclaimed film Le cose belle. The film will be shown free on a first come first serve basis at 7 PM, Warren Auditorium, Mother Rosalie Hill Hall, at the University of San Diego. You won't want to miss this beautiful and poignant story of four Neapolitan youth, and how they change over a 10 year period.

On December 10 and 11 SDIFF is premiering in San Diego another film, Mona Lisa Is Missing, which will show at the Ultrastar theater in the Hazard Center on December 10 at 7:30 and at La Paloma in Encinitas on December 11 at 7 PM, along with the director Joe Madeiros who will do a Q & A at each venue. This is a light-hearted prize-winner about the theft of the Mona Lisa from the Louvre in 1911 by an Italian worker, who brought it back to Italy in December, 101 years ago. And beginning in January SDIFF will begin its monthly series in Encinitas and in San Diego with an array of excellent movies. ITALIAN ADULT LANGUAGE CLASSES

WINTER 2015

Adult Classes Description

BEGINNER ITALIAN I - for absolute beginners

Goal: This course gives students the basic tools needed to successfully understand and communicate in Italian. At the completion of this course students should be able to greet others, introduce themselves, talk about themselves and others, and describe people, things, and places. **Grammar:** Pronunciation, subject pronouns, c'è (there is) and ci sono (there are), indicative present tense of essere (to be), avere (to have), articles, gender and plural of nouns, numbers 0-49

BEGINNER ITALIAN II - for students with very basic knowledge of Italian

Goal: this course builds on Beginner Italian I and provides students a stronger and wider skills set necessary to understand, speak, read and write in Italian. At the end of the course students should be able to talk about the Italian education system, to order and to talk about food and drinks, as well as discuss common activities, leisure time, trip planning, daily life. **Grammar:** reinforcement and practice of tenses of the indicative mood, irregular verbs in –are, prepositions, partitive, adjectives and adverbs of quantity.

INTERMEDIATE ITALIAN I - for students with a fairly good command of Italian

Goal: this course builds on Beginner Italian II and provides students a stronger and wider skill set necessary to understand, speak, read and write in Italian. At the end of the course students should be able to talk about the family and traditions, trip reservation and planning. **Grammar:** reinforcement and practice of tenses of the indicative mood; irregular verbs in -ere, -ire; possessive adjectives, direct pronouns, present perfect with essere or avere, reflexive verbs.

INTERMEDIATE ITALIAN II - for students with a good command of Italian

Goal: this course builds on Intermediate Italian I. At the end of the course students should be able to talk about money and work, media and movies. **Grammar:** reflexive verbs, indirect pronouns, imperfetto tense and the use of imperfetto versus passato prossimo, pluperfect tense and adverbs.

ADVANCED ITALIAN I - for students with strong command of the language

Goal: to give students the tools to be able to talk in detail about Italian fashion, free time and house and furniture. **Grammar:** the course will be focused on imperative and demonstrative adjectives will be studied, future tense, verb piacere, ne and ci, double pronouns.

ADVANCED ITALIAN II - for students with strong command of the language

Goal: to give students the tools to talk in detail about trades and professions, geographical descriptions, sports. **Grammar:** conditional mood, present and past, comparatives and superlatives, relative pronouns and indefinite pronouns,

negative expressions, gerund and progressive form.

ADVANCED ITALIAN III - for students with strong command of the language

Goal: to give students the tools to talk in detail about health, environment; music, art and theatre. **Grammar:** remote past, verbs and verbal expressions with infinitive, subjunctive mood; present and past subjunctive of irregular verbs; conjunctions and subjunctive; subjunctive imperfetto and pluperfect; how to use all the subjunctive tenses in complex sentences.

BEGINNER INTERMEDIATE AND ADVANCED CONVERSATION

Italian culture - art, cuisine, cinema, lifestyles, music, fashion, etc- is the starting point for a number of conversations and discussions that will help students to both enrich their knowledge of Italy and build a larger vocabulary. Includes practical usage and review of the grammar previously studied.

ABC CONVERSATION (requires Beginner 2 completed)

This is a very basic conversation class and it is intended for students that have completed Beginner 2. Students will have the chance to practice the grammar structures acquired in Beginner 1 and Beginner 2 and expand their vocabulary. An easy reader book will be used in class to guide the students through the course.

NOTE:

- ABC Conversation requires Begin. Italian II+ (or equivalent)
- Beginner Conversation requires Intermediate Italian I+ (or equivalent)
- Intermediate Conversation requires Intermediate Italian II+ (or equivalent);
- Advanced Conversation requires
 Advanced Italian I+ (or equivalent)

NEW! IL CINEMA ITALIANO DEI GRANDI REGISTI - IN PART-NERSHIP WITH SAN DIEGO ITALIAN FILM FESTIVAL

This conversational class is designed for intermediate and advanced students. Join a friendly and casual environment to practice and improve your Italian in a fun and non-judgmental forum. Various topics and general subjects will be discussed.

FLearning Italian as we discover the hidden jewels of a city, the places where locals go instead of the usual tourist venues, tiny towns with great history, central areas where forgotten crime stories of the past still linger, typical restaurants and small shops where you can find that particular item you cannot miss. Everybody knows about Florence and Rome and Naples, but can you say you really heard the true story of Vigevano, Pienza and Tropea? The underserved areas of the country will be the focus of this course as we improve the Italian language and understand the culture of a country known as the center of the ancient world. This course will focus on a specific city and its region and is addressed to high intermediate to advanced level students. In this first course we will focus on Milan and Lombardy. Goal: at the completion of this course students should be able to greet others, introduce themselves, talk about themselves and others and describe people, things and places. Grammar: pronunciation, subject pronouns, c'è (there is) and ci sono (there are), indicative present tense of essere (to be), avere (to have), articles, genere and plural of nous, numbers 0-49.

NOTE: Doppio Espresso I is equivalent to Beginner Italian I. Doppio Espresso classes meet twice a week and Beginner classes meet once a week.



Some Italian specialties for the Holidays

Panettone

Panettone is the traditional Christmas Cake of the Milanesi, and has become the most common Christmas cake in Italy thanks to its keeping qualities. Industry can churn them out and they stay fresh. So industry does, and pastry shops everywhere also make them. It's a deserved popularity, because it is SO good.

Pandoro

Pandoro is Verona's answer to Panettone, a rich, buttery cake that's generally sprinkled with an abundance of powdered sugar. Unlike panettone, it never contains candied fruit, and for some this is a plus. It is remarkably good in any case.

Struffoli

Struffoli (they're always plural) are fried dough balls dipped in a honey syrup, shaped into a wreath, and sprinkled with diavolilli, a type of candy. Sounds (and is) quite rich, and is also probably extremely old -- this sort of use of honey as a sweetener dates back to the Roman times. It's a specialty from Southern Italy.

Caggionetti

Some associate caggionetti with Naples, but these fried cookies are made in other parts of the South as well.

Susamielli

These traditional Neapolitan Christmas cookies are S-shaped. For two possible reasons: First, in the past they were called sesamielli, and covered with sesame seeds. Second, they were (and are) also called Sapienze, because they were made by nuns of the Monastero della Sapienza.

Pandoro or Panettone?

Riccirelli

Mention amaretti, and many think of the little, crisp, tinned almond macaroons one finds for sale in supermarkets. However, there are many variations; in particular, in many areas the freshly made amaretti sold in pastry shops are soft and chewy (the only requirement for amaretti is some bitterness, generally from almonds or peach pits, to offset their sweetness). Senesi add some orange when they make ricciarelli, and the results are extraordinary.

Cartellate

Dough, fried quickly and dipped in honey. Sounds simple, but they're very good.

Panforte

Some say Panforte is so good it allowed a Novitiate nun to drive the Devil from her convent, while others say it's older still, the centerpiece of the feast the Baby Jesus prepared for a street urchin who gave him his last crust of bread. Could be either, but it's good regardless.



A CHRISTMAS LEGEND

The story of Befana

Like children everywhere, Italian kids look forward to the arrival of the red-suited Babbo Natale on Christmas Eve. However, this relatively modern tradition pales in comparison to the anticipation generated by the arrival of an old witch in early January. On Epiphany Eve, the old, tattered and soot-covered Befana flies around the world on a broomstick and comes down chimneys to deliver candy and presents to children who have been good during the year. For those who have fallen a bit short of model behavior, la Befana will leave lumps of coal. (Realizing that no one can be perfect for a whole year, these days la Befana often leaves a sweet "lump of coal" made from black sugar.)

La Befana has been an Italian tradition since the XIII century and comes from Christian legend rather than popular culture. The story is that la Befana was approached by the Three Wise Men who asked her to lead them to the stable where the baby Jesus lay in a manger. La Befana was too busy cleaning her house at the time, so she declined the offer to go with them. Very soon she realized that she had made a huge mistake, so she gathered up a bag full of gifts and set off alone in search of the baby Jesus. Though she followed the same star as the Magi, she was unable to find the stable. Undaunted, la Befana continues to travel the world over to this day searching every house for the Christ child. On January 6, the first day of Epiphany, Italian children hold their breaths as they search their stockings for a sign that they have been good that year.

The arrival of la Befana marks the end of the long and festive holiday season in Italy.


