

New Italian Wine Class at ICC!

The Italian Cultural Center of San Diego and the Italian Sommelier Association of California are excited to present their inaugural Italian Wine class in San Diego County.

The Italian Sommelier Association (ISA) was founded in 1965 and is the foremost authority in wine education and Sommelier services in Italy. Globally, it is part of the W.S.A, 'World Sommelier Association', the largest Sommelier Association in the world, known for their extremely high curriculum standards. Recently opened in the United States with branches in Los Angeles and Washington DC, the ISA is the leading educational and consulting authority on Italian wines.

The ISA mission is to train, educate and prepare professional "wine experts" in all aspects of wine, not just the narrowly defined "restaurant service" that is sometimes associated with Sommelier education. The ISA believes that the high level of competition in the wine & spirits and hospitality industries requires a renewed level of commitment to education.

This course consists of 18-20 hours of class time and tasting with an exam in order to get the certification, issued by ISA California. The class will explore all the 20 wine regions of Italy, their wine laws, grape varietals and include a brief overview of cuisine and culture.

A portion of the class will be dedicated to wine tasting technique and the sophisticated wine service for which the ISA is famous. The classes will be coordinated by Andrea Zarattini and two Professional Sommeliers well



known as two of the most renowned authorities in the United States. This course will be extremely beneficial to both wine industry professionals and enthusiasts who are interested in the vast world of Italian wine and requires no previous wine knowledge.

The course includes the following material that will be given the first day of class:

- "The Wine Tasting" by Italian Sommelier Association
- Wine Colors Chart
- Sommelier Case with N. 3 Bormioli Tasting Glasses

The price for the full course, including the above listed material, is \$625. The course will require a minimum of 12 and a maximum of 20 students. The tentative schedule for this course is Saturday January 22nd, 29th, February 5th and 12th 2011 from 2:00pm to 7:00pm.

Gems of Italy - The residences of the Savoy dynasty

Built as a royal hunting lodge in the early 18th century, the "Palazzina di caccia" of Stupinigi ("the little hunting Palace of Stupinigi") was built in 1729 by order of Vittorio Amedeo II of Savoy, king of Sardinia, as a shooting lodge near Turin, Italy. The design and construction of the building and its decorations were assigned to the architect Filippo Juvarra. The hunting lodge is symbolized by the bronze statue of a stag standing on top of the roof of its central dome. The Palace is listed as a "World Heritage Site" by UNESCO and is furnished with original period furniture.

Dr. Nicolas Reveles visits ICC



On November 10, 2010, the Italian Community Center's President Roberto Ruocco welcomed Dr. Nicolas Reveles, San Diego

Opera's Geisel Director of Education as its accomplished guest speaker.

Dr. Reveles is a well known pianist and composer of the opera, *Rumpestiltskin*. He is a graduate of the Manhattan School of Music in New York City.

Dr. Reveles spoke about the opera's foundation being based upon Greek tragedies and plays, which were set to music. Great composers such as Bizet, Gounod, and Puccini, three maestros whose *Europa* (romance language Operas) will be presented during the 2011 season.

Dr. Reveles, in his inimitable style, explained musical arches, demonstrating by raising his hands to illustrate rising and falling notes. He played the aria *Nessun Dorma* sung by Luciano Pavarotti from Puccini's *Turandot*, which was performed at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York City. Dr. Reveles discussed Puccini's pentatonic scales, which he used in *Turandot*, *La Bohème*, and *Madame Butterfly*. Puccini's lyrical style was presented and the measures he used in his research. Puccini lived in New York and attended Broadway plays and ventured uptown to Harlem to hear great jazz musicians. He also listened to a Chinese melody from a music box, which inspired him to

compose *Turandot*. Puccini never finished *Turandot* before his death.

Puccini was an avant-garde composer who introduced bitonality. This technique is contemporary today but was put to good use by Puccini leading up to the great *Nessun Dorma* aria sung by Prince Calaf. Bitonality created an emotional/confrontational state thus manipulating the audience.

Dr. Reveles' then discussed the second *Europa Opera Faust* by Gounod. He went into detail about the main characters and France's Second Empire with the construction of Paris' famous opera house. In this opera house audiences experienced a sense of awe, which was symbolic of the Second French Empire with such operas as *The Phantom of the Opera*. Composer Gounod has his heroine Marguerite rescued by angels but the audience is not sure what happens to Faust, who sold his soul to the devil. The opera, *Faust*, was a perfect fit for France's grand operatic period.

In this opera, Dr. Reveles stressed that there is a great emotional expression including the music of a Christian hymn, *Angels We Have Heard On High*.

Dr. Reveles was in his very own element when he discussed Bizet's opera, *Carmen*. *Carmen* was a bona fide seductress, a gypsy, who challenged male suitors to love her with no promise of any love being rendered on her part. Some of her suitors were Don Jose and Escamilo, the toreador.

According to Dr. Reveles, *Carmen* is the most Italian of all French operas.

Carmen was a nineteenth century opera relished by Italians. Dr. Reveles spoke about Bizet's music becoming more jagged thus losing his lyricism. Bizet used dance to tell his story. Throughout his presentation, Nicolas used his hands as a conductor would do to lead his orchestra to create an atmosphere in which one could imagine *Carmen* and her gypsy troupe seducing Don Jose and Escamilo.

WHAT IS OPERA? Well, its a composer telling his story using music and drama to convey the plot. Many operas are tragic in nature. Opera creates an emotional experience for the theatre goers. Opera seduces these drama lovers to stay and desire more by challenging each person's senses. Each theater participant relates with specific characters thus revealing his/her own human frailties and experiences related to world themes of today.

Chef Kenneth Spratt served una *squisita zuppa* (bean soup), artichoke hearts, aged blue cheese, cubed red beets, large green olives and a delicious *prosciutto/salame panini* with many "ingredients."

Grazie mille a Dr. Nicolas Reveles. Before Dr. Reveles' departure he shared an experience he has had with Roberto Ruocco's aunt who lives in Napoli. What a small world!

Professor Calvin Trowbridge Jr. gave two exceptional presentations (one at the Italian Community Center in Piccola Italia and the other one at the House of Italy in Balboa Park.) Professor Trowbridge featured his newly published work, Marconi, (1874-1937. Born outside of Bologna, Italia Father of Wireless, Grandfather of Radio, Great-Grandfather of the Cell Phone) The Story of the Race to Control Long-Distance Wireless. According to Mr. Trowbridge Jr., Marconi's love for science and his perseverance enabled him to use other scientists' dabbling with electromagnetic wave experiments. His experiments produced his wireless technology, which was sought after by world governments, in particular their navies. Marconi was an Italian patriot who served in Italy's navy. He was a scientist, whose numerous patents were turned over to the Italian Government. His research and experiments were avant-garde with transmitting electrical impulses and signals. According to Professor Trowbridge's research, Marconi advanced communication among continents and islands and between ships and ship and shore. Italian scientist, Marconi unleashed and controlled the power of electromagnetic transmission through the air.



Adult Classes Description

BEGINNER ITALIAN I - *for absolute beginners*

Goal: This course gives students the basic tools needed to successfully understand and communicate in Italian. At the completion of this course students should be able to greet others, introduce themselves, ask for information and directions, talk about themselves and others, and describe people, things, and places. **Grammar:** Pronunciation, subject pronouns, c'è (there is) and ci sono (there are), indicative present tense of essere (to be), avere (to have) and regular verbs in -are, articles, gender and plural of nouns, numbers 0-49, formal and informal communication, prepositions, interrogative.

BEGINNER ITALIAN II - *for students with very basic knowledge of Italian*

Goal: this course builds on Beginner Italian I and provides students a stronger and wider skill set necessary to understand, speak, read and write in Italian. At the end of the course students should be able to talk about the Italian education system, to order and to talk about food and drinks, as well as discuss common activities, leisure time, trip planning, daily life. **Grammar:** reinforcement and practice of tenses of the indicative mood, including prepositions, partitive, adjectives and adverbs of quantity.

INTERMEDIATE ITALIAN I - *for students with a fairly good command of Italian*

Goal: this course builds on Beginner Italian II and provides students a stronger and wider skill set necessary to understand, speak, read and write in Italian. At the end of the course students should be able to talk about common activities, leisure time, daily life, the family and traditions, trip reservation and planning. **Grammar:** reinforcement and practice of tenses of the indicative mood; irregular verbs in -are, -ere, -ire; possessive adjectives, direct pronouns, present perfect with essere or avere.

INTERMEDIATE ITALIAN II - *for students with a good command of Italian*

Goal: this course builds on Intermediate Italian I. At the end of the course students should be able to talk about money, media, Italian fashion, weather and time. **Grammar:** reflexive verbs, adverbs of time; imperfetto tense and the use of imperfetto versus passato prossimo; pluperfect tense, imperative and demonstrative adjectives will be studied.

ADVANCED ITALIAN I - *for students with a strong command of Italian*

Goal: to give students the tools to be able to talk in detail about food, recipes and how to order; vacations and free time; house and furniture. **Grammar:** the course will be focused on direct and indirect pronouns, imperative with a pronoun; future tense, verb piacere; irregular plurals; ne and ci, double pronouns.

ADVANCED ITALIAN II - *for students with a strong command of Italian*

Goal: to give students the tools to talk in detail about trades and professions; geographical descriptions; sports. **Grammar:** conditional mood, present and past; verbs and expressions with infinitive; comparatives and superlatives; relative pronouns and indefinite pronouns.

ADVANCED ITALIAN III - *for students with a strong command of Italian*

Goal: to give students the tools to talk in detail about health and environment; music, art and theatre. **Grammar:** passato remote; gerund and progressive form; subjunctive mood; present and past subjunctive of irregular verbs; conjunctions and subjunctive; subjunctive imperfetto and pluperfect; how to use all the subjunctive tenses in complex sentences.

BEGINNER INTERMEDIATE AND ADVANCED CONVERSATION

Italian culture - art, cuisine, cinema, lifestyles, music, fashion, etc- is the starting point for a number of conversations and discussions that will help students to both enrich their knowledge of Italy and build a larger vocabulary. Includes practical usage and review of the grammar previously studied.

NOTE:

- **Beginner Conversation requires Beginner Italian II+ (or equivalent)**
- **Intermediate Conversation requires Intermediate Italian I+ (or equivalent);**
- **Advanced Conversation requires Advanced Italian I+ (or equivalent)**

SPECIAL INTEREST CLASSES

EARLY MODERN ITALIAN HISTORY: A PANORAMA

All you wanted to know about Italy and its past through a compelling panorama on Italian history taught in English by UCSD historian Ginevra Crosignani, P.h.D. This course will focus on the early modern history of Italy from the discovery of America in 1492 to the unification of Italy in 1870.

Special attention will be placed on the historical and philosophical movements that shaped Italy into a modern age country, leaving an intellectual and artistic heritage that defines so much of Italian culture. Humanism, Renaissance, and Risorgimento will be presented and explored in class once a week. The course will feature weekly lectures followed by questions and answers and an open discussion session. The entire course will be conducted in English so that everyone will be able to enjoy it regardless of Italian language skills.

Instructor Ginevra Crosignani was born and raised in Rome Italy. She received her Laurea Degree (MA) in Political Sciences with a major in History and her PhD in History, both at the University of Rome "La Sapienza". Ginevra has taught History classes at the California Institute of Technology (Pasadena, CA) from 2005 and was a post-doctoral scholar at the California Institute for Telecommunications and Information Technology (Calit2) at UCSD until most recently. She has published articles and books on European and British Intellectual History and History of Science. Don't miss this unique opportunity!

ITALIAN THROUGH SHORT FILMS - LEVEL II

This eight week class is built around six original and enjoyable Italian shorts nominated for various prestigious prizes such as "David di Donatello" and "Globo D'Oro".

The shorts will be broken down scene by scene and the teacher will lead the class in specific exercises and fun games specially designed to reinforce grammar subjects, improve conversation skills, and build vocabulary. All films are in Italian with English subtitles that will be turned off when needed.

The films:

- "Fuori dal giro" by Marcello Cotugno e Dario Iacobelli
- "Red Pause" by Italo Pesce Delfino
- "Giganti" by Fabio Mollo

This class is designed for an intermediate to advanced proficiency level. The completion of Intermediate Italian I is required to enroll.

ITALIAN THROUGH OPERA

This eleven week class will introduce students to the beauty and fun of traditional Italian opera as a means of learning the language and appreciating the culture of Italy. Four masterworks will offer a unique opportunity to study Italian in culturally authentic contexts: L'Elisir d'Amore by Gaetano Donizetti, La Traviata and Otello by Giuseppe Verdi and Turandot by Giacomo Puccini.

Students will learn about characters, historical and cultural issues, plots, settings, and themes. At the same time, as they follow the story, they will acquire vocabulary, grammatical structures and fluency to express their ideas and opinions.

Designed for Intermediate and Advanced levels, this class will meet weekly for two hours and it will be taught by Rosamaria Ruggeri, who has also been teaching Italian at SDSU since fall 2000. A native of Bergamo, and an opera enthusiast, Ms. Ruggeri holds a Master Degree in Comparative Literature and passed the PhD Qualifying Examinations at UCSD. Ms. Ruggeri's methodological approach is communicative in scope, she is known for creating a challenging yet relaxed atmosphere in class and for engaging students in a process of participation and effective learning. Don't miss this unique opportunity!

NEW! TOURING ITALY THROUGH ITS REGIONS- PART II

This course is the perfect blending of language and culture and will give students an opportunity to learn more about the Italian regions through their geography, culture, traditions, local productions, curiosities and famous characters. Designed with the intermediate to advanced students in mind, it includes readings, grammar, vocabulary, listening and comprehension exercises. This is the second of three parts. The first was held during the summer quarter. This the class will focus on 5 regions, there will be a Part III focusing on the remaining regions of Italy. No book is needed, educational materials are included and will be distributed weekly by the teacher.

CONVERSATION WITH A BOOK - (BEG. AND INT.)

The **beginner** conversation class is designed for students who have taken Beginner Italian I and II, This class will be supported by one simplified Italian book with CD, which will be used as a point of reference for conversation to help build up vocabulary.

The **intermediate** conversation class is designed for those students who have taken Intermediate Italian I and II. It will be supported by an intermediate level reading book and CD.

Both classes run for 10 weeks, tuition fee is \$135 and the book and CD are included in the price. Students will read and discuss the book in class and will also be assigned special homework each week.

ITALIAN FOR YOU

The name of the class says it all! This class is tailor made for you. It requires an advanced knowledge of Italian and a special interest in taking the experience of learning Italian one step up. The curriculum is developed by the teacher with the input of the students, who get to participate in the shaping of this one of a kind class. No book is necessary, educational materials will be provided on a weekly basis as the course unfolds. EXPLORING ITALY THROUGH WINE AND REGIONAL FOOD

The class “Exploring Italy through wine and Regional food” is landing in the Emilia Romagna territory, notable for its wine and excellent food. Every Italian region is justifiably proud of its own cuisine, considers it in fact to be the best in the whole world. But ask any Italian to name just one region, one region in all of Italy, that’s known above all for its culinary prowess and he’ll admit: it’s Emilia-Romagna.

In Modena and Reggio Emilia they make the world’s best balsamic vinegar “Tradizionale” DOP along with Zampone and Cotechino IGP; in Parma and Reggio Emilia the best aged cows’ cheese (Parmigiano Reggiano DOP) and cured ham (prosciutto di Parma DOP), in Piacenza the famous Coppa Piacentina, in Ferrara the exquisite bread called Coppia Ferrarese IGP and in Romagna with the unique Formaggio Di Fossa di Sogliano sul Rubicone DOP following a tradition 700 years old; And what about the regional capital? Ah, you must mean Bologna la Grassa (the Fat). As Italy’s capital of gastronomy, Bologna was known as la grassa (the fat), a description less flattering today than it once was. But the city still gloats over a land of plenty that extends along the fertile southern flank of the Po. Emilia (to the west of Bologna) and Romagna (to the east) flaunt their considerable differences, but together share Italy’s most luxuriant tables.

Bologna is the birthplace of tortellini—little rings of pasta stuffed with savory meats and gooey cheeses. This is the land that invented the ragú sauce atop tagliatelle alla Bolognese. The local cured meat named mortadella remains so wildly popular the world over (particularly in school lunches) that most cultures call it simply “Bologna”—or, if you prefer, “baloney.” In Emilia the premier wine is Lambrusco, in frothy shades of purple to pink, made from grapes grown on high trellised vines, mainly in the flat lands south of the Po. Romagna’s wines come primarily from the native grapes, Sangiovese, Trebbiano and Albana, the variety that accounted for Italy’s first white DOCG.

Only students age 21 and over can enroll in this course. No text book is required, but you’ll need to bring your own glasses: two wine glasses (one for red and one for white) are necessary to attend the course.

The cost for this one night class is \$30 and includes food, wine and fun. Hurry to enroll as seating is limited to a maximum of 20 students. The class starts at 6:45pm on January, 13, 2011.



CHILDREN CLASSES

We teach children Italian as they would learn it while growing up in Italy by hearing it. They play games, listen to stories, do crafts, and sing songs. As they participate in these pleasant activities, the children develop vocabulary, improve conversation skills, and develop writing ability.


